## **VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL 2007**

**This year an amazing group of kids Took the Plunge and Made a Splash with Jesus at Vacation Bible School during the week of July 16 - 20. We had a total of seventy-eight children registered this year, averaging about seventy children each day. The children experienced a wide variety of activities during the week - great lessons, music, crafts, games, a treasure hunt, great food, many community service projects, a Wet & Wild Day at the Water Park, and the Water Park Splash Party.**

**This year's lessons were all about water and Jesus' love. Each day during the opening, Pastor Sherwindt introduced the day's lesson, and our kids learned about a splash point to go along with each lesson. Monday we learned to Plunge into Obedience through the story of the miraculous catch of fish. Tuesday we learned to Plunge into Worship through the story of Jesus and the woman at the well. Wednesday we learned to Plunge into Courage after hearing the story of Jesus calming the storm. Thursday we learned to Plunge into Faith with the story of Jesus walking on water. This lesson was quite fitting for Thursday because all of us had to have faith that day with terrible storms in the weather forecast. We thought our Water Day would have to be cancelled, but God blessed us with a great day after all, and the rain and storms started only after our day was complete! Thanks be to God! Finally, Friday we learned to Plunge into Service with the story of Jesus washing the disciples' feet. In fact, we lived and learned this last splash point all week with all of the great service work the children did!**

## **LET'S PRAY ABOUT IT**

Philip Yancey, author of the very popular book *What's So Amazing about Grace*, has written a book about prayer entitled *Prayer: Does It Make Any Difference?* This is a book that explores such basic questions as: Is God listening? If God knows all, is there even a point to praying? Why do so many prayers go unanswered? While the author has much to teach us about the value of prayer, he begins by interviewing ordinary people like you and me about prayer. He writes, "I interviewed ordinary people about prayer. Typically the results went like this: Is prayer important to you? Oh, yes. How often do you pray? Every day. Approximately how long? Five minutes Well, maybe seven. Do you find prayer satisfying? Not really. Do you sense the presence of God when you pray? Occasionally, not often. Many of those I talked to experienced prayer more as a burden than as a pleasure. They regarded it as important, but felt guilty about their failure, blaming themselves."

Manv of us would like to improve the quality of our praver life. but wonder where to begin. Pr.

Yancey recounts a brief encounter with a student of his in Chicago. "I was teaching a class at a church in Chicago, when a young woman raised her hand with a question. I knew her as a shy conscientious student who attended faithfully but never spoke. The rest of the class seemed surprised as well and listened attentively. 'I'm not always sincere when I pray,' she began. 'Sometimes it seems forced, more like a ritual. I'm just repeating words. Does God hear those prayers? Should I keep going even though I have no confidence that I am doing it right?' I let the silence hang in the room for a moment before attempting an answer. 'Do you notice how quiet it is in here?' I said. 'We all sense your honesty. It took courage for you to be vulnerable, and you touched a nerve with others of us in the room. You seem sincere. We're tuned in, listening, respectful, because you are being authentic. I imagine it's the same with God. More than anything, God wants your authentic self.'" [pp. 40-41]

Ginny Rhodes came across this book in her desire to expand our prayer ministries at Zion beyond the well-established presence of our Prayer Chain. We'll get together on Monday evenings to talk about prayer, using this book by Philip Yancey to focus our questions and our interests. While the formal startup of this Monday evening group will occur after Rally Day in September, if you would like to help us preview this book, just let Ginny, Carol Rossbach, or Pastor know of your interest

## **CHURCH COUNCIL NEWS**

We took a moment to acknowledge Carol Rossbach's first Council meeting as our elected President, and then enjoyed yet another meeting with excellent attendance: Carol, Jayne Schrader, Dave Palumbo, Cindy Ferry, Mary Humbert, Betty Tracy, Steve Ross, Bob Lancashire, Chris Thomas, Pastor Sherwindt. We met for several minutes with Jim Fidler, the newly appointed chairperson of the Task Force charged with overseeing our response to boiler-related problems at Zion. Jim indicated that half the building has heat but no air-conditioning, and half the building has air-conditioning but problems with heat. Ours is a hodge-podge of systems, which include three heating units and four air-conditioning units, which range in age from twenty-five to forty-seven years old. He looks forward to calling his first meeting with the Task Force in the very near future.

The Pastor's Report reviewed our fabulous Mission Trip to New Orleans, and then looked ahead to our two fundraisers for the Sanctuary Renovation Fund. Our experiences in New Orleans have been well-documented in newsletters, through sermons, and on the website. Plans for moving ahead with fund-raising for our Sanctuary Renovations have been very nicely received and supported.

The Treasurer's Report showed that our Operating Budget deficit, which ended the first quarter of 2007 in the red at (\$6,398.95), has remained unchanged through the second quarter, and now stands at (\$6,397.85). In other words, income for April, May, and June has held steady with expenses. We hope this pattern continues in July and August, which will increase our chances of making good progress against the deficit when the program year begins in September.

The President's Report included reference to resources that were shared at the Synod Assembly, especially as this related to issues of stewardship. Carol spoke about being impressed by Pr. Ishler's observation that we take time with bulletins, newsletters, and even announcements to extend thank you's for everything that members do, except for the giving of money. One congregation had Statements of Intent, and often thanked persons for honoring or exceeding their Statement of Intent. No amounts were mentioned, just that a good number of members were reaching their personal goals, which was helping the church to meet its goals.

## MEN OF ZION NEWS

The Men of Zion began another month with a mix of dinner and conversation for a nice evening with some great fellowship. We have an active summer schedule, which included the Lutheran Men in Mission "best ball" scramble at the Raintree Country Club in Green on July 14, support of Vacation Bible School the week of July 16-20, and then a special presentation offered by Jim Fidler at our monthly meeting in August. Jim has some great stories as a litigator with the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and he has offered to keep us entertained for the evening, as long as all of us know that we've been sworn to secrecy for the better part of eternity, should any questions ever arise about anything that Jim may have shared about area 51 in Roswell, Arizona!

Actually, Jim's presentation covered mostly cold war stories of counter-espionage with the Soviets, then the Russians, with some insights into China, too.
